## Reducing Poverty – stepping up locally

① Many Australians are not enjoying a decent standard of living, especially in non-metropolitan areas. Almost 4% more people living in country South Australia experience life below the poverty line than their metropolitan counterparts.

② Poverty is a complex issue and is not just caused by individual experiences but by major inequalities in the structure of our society. Some of the main causes of poverty include limited access to: work and income, education, housing, health and community services.

**ac.care steps up and responds to the local needs** of people living in the South East, Riverland and Murrayland regions of South Australia.

**Work & Income** Many people working and trying to support a family on a minimum wage struggle to meet basic costs of living each week. ac.care provides emergency financial relief in times of crisis along with support and guidance for a range of life's challenges faced by individuals and families on a low income.

**Education** Low education levels are linked with unemployment and subsequently the risk of living in poverty. ac.care provides links to educational opportunities and assists young people to re-engage with mainstream education and support services where needed.

## Housing

People on low incomes rarely own homes and rent is often unaffordable. ac.care provides low rental properties and emergency accommodation in times of crises while helping people find long-term accommodation. ac.care assisted 984 people towards self reliance by increasing their access to safe and secure housing options. ## Health

People living in poverty commonly suffer greater levels of physical and mental illness. The high stress of living in poverty can contribute to substance abuse and poor diet and the associated health risks. ac.care provides support and works closely with local health care services for people experiencing challenges associated with poverty.

## Services

Access to affordable community services is an important poverty prevention strategy to help disadvantaged people participate in a social and economic life. In the Murraylands of South Australia ac.care creates many opportunities for individuals, families and young people to fully embrace life and all its potential.

**44,122 people were assisted with immediate financial need, gaining skills to better manage their money, increased their participation in their local communities and took up the challenge to improve their education and seek out job prospects through ac.care's initiatives.** FY09

*ac.care Community Services Manager, Gregory Were said, "ac.care does this by encouraging people seeking assistance to consider the many aspects of their lives to find innovative and sustainable solutions. ac.care focuses on skill development, early intervention and prevention to make a real difference and help fight poverty and hardship."*
