ac.care's head office is in Mount Gambier. ac.care was created by country people for country people. We operate across the Adelaide Hills, Limestone Coast, Murray Mallee and Riverland.

181 families opened their homes and hearts as foster carers with ac.care 155 foster carers updated their skills through professional training

33 volunteers donated their time, energy and skills Their ages range from 20 to 86. 282 people successfully used early intervention services and avoided becoming homeless

Board Convenor's report

Our board and staff have been busy under the leadership of new CEO Shane Maddocks preparing ac.care for the future. Shane's personable style has resulted in him being warmly welcomed by all. There is much being done organisationally and we are fortunate to have a skilled and caring leader at the helm.

The past year has seen the preparation of a revised and robust new Strategic Plan. We have a clear view of our purpose as a social services organisation, the business we want to be in, and the risks that we face as the work of caring and assisting those in need gets done. The emphasis is about building resilience and opportunities with country people. We want to reduce homelessness, poverty, isolation, and to support families and children to be strong and safe.

Although we are an organisation that does respond to Government funded policy and priorities, we have a desire to fulfil community identified need. We recall that our origin in the South East region, over 30 years ago, was about turning a caused-based need into a community-based solution.

To fully achieve our purpose we are preparing strategic directions that include openness, repositioning, and heading where the needs of the communities we serve might lead.

As the social services sector experiences significant change in the ways that services are offered, provided and funded, we will see individualised and activity based funding models along with trends to client directed services. We have the capacity, the experience, and the caring staff who are planning to be ready, flexible, and responsive.

Nykeilah's Story

Can you tell me a bit about your story and where you were at when you first engaged with ac.care?

I was still in school, my depression was really bad and so was my anxiety. I didn't have a lot of friends. I lived with my Nanna but wanted to move to Adelaide. I asked for support to move and they offered me a rental in Berri and support to finish school here.

What has being involved with ac.care meant for you? How has it helped you?

Jo (Housing) was so good. Jo got me a laptop and into my course Certificate 4 in Community Services, which got me my job.

Emma (Opening Doors) has been awesome, providing transport support to appointments and helping to coordinate appointments for my health and wellbeing. She has been really good to talk to as well and shared her life experience/wisdom.

I don't have my depression and anxiety as bad as I used to, I don't even think it exists anymore.

What are some of your achievements that you are proud of?

I finished school, and obtained a traineeship at Relationships Australia. I love working there.

I also really like my house.

How do you think life might be different if you didn't receive support from ac.care?

I would have had to get myself to appointments and maybe wouldn't have kept up with them. I may have moved to Adelaide which I probably would have enjoyed but I wouldn't have had this traineeship opportunity and my laptop to study.

Would you recommend ac.care services to other people and why?

I would, in fact I think I have recommended people to come to ac.care if they are in need of housing.

Flowers for Gail

The dad who sent these flowers has struggled with many things in his life but he is trying really desperately to do the best for his children. He has 2 boys with disability (fragile x syndrome) and a daughter. When he recently lost his licence Gail supported the family to have transport so that the boys could continue to attend appointments with their Speech Pathologist and Occupational Therapist. His feedback with the flowers to Gail was you deserve it because my boys are so much better with their speech. Other people can understand what they say now."



Andrew's Journey

Andrew (32) found himself without a home after having left a drug and alcohol rehabilitation centre.

When he needed a shower, food and conversation Andrew started visiting the Mount Gambier Community Centre. It was close to Christmas and many hands were needed to wrap the hundreds of donated presents. Andrew thanked our staff for letting him help and to our staff's amazement he told them he had never before wrapped a present.

After many conversations, Andrew decided it was time to reconnect with his family back in Tasmania. As the 'black sheep' of the family he felt nothing he had done was ever good enough, but he was in a good place now and felt the time was right to reconnect. He organised a plan together with the homelessness team.

On the morning of his departure, Andrew was excited and apprehensive.

Waiting for the bus he was very nervous and began to have self-doubts, but he courageously did board the bus to start his journey.

Later Andrew sent the following sms:

Matt's pathway to self reliance

"After I separated from my wife, I was effectively homeless, only being able to stay with her uncle for a short time. My ex-wife and I decided that our son would be better off in my care due to his higher care requirements. This was at a time when everyone within the family was extremely stressed.

After attempting to get private housing, I signed up to do the Tenancy Education Program (TED) which helped me understand why I was unsuccessful in finding permanent housing. When a suitable fully furnished unit became available, I was able to start caring for my son. After months of uncertainty, this gave me great relief. To know that I WILL have a bed for my son and myself was the best feeling.

Part of the process of getting housing was to undergo some financial counselling. This was the first real opportunity I had to verify that my finances were under control and all my debts were manageable.

My case worker and I had weekly "catch-up" sessions. She helps make sure the household is running as smoothly as possible (she always brings a bag of fruit, veggies and a loaf of bread) and helps me look into any future issues I may have. Jenn is absolutely awesome. Just having her come around means I can have someone supportive I can talk to.

One of the issues we talked about was my Uni studies that I had stopped doing. I have great difficulty sorting and writing my thoughts out. Jenn suggested I have a talk to Viv, who works in Adult Education at the Community Centre, to see if there was anything she could do to help me. After only a few sessions, Viv has had me writing things that I thought I could never do. Today I have been able to write this report! This makes me feel so ecstatic that I have been able to write these things, I tell everyone about it."

David and Justine's separation rollercoaster

David and Justine had recently separated and were looking for how to best support their three children through this difficult time.

David came to the Family Relationship Centre in October 2017, being concerned about the care and parenting arrangements for the children. After exploring his support options, he opted for mediation and personal counselling.

Within a few weeks, David and Justine started the mediation process. To better prepare, they attended separate Children in Focus sessions. Following this experience, David sought ongoing support with how to 'parent after separation'. He could not speak highly enough of the child focused teaching in the program and how helpful he found the support.

Soon after, David had his first appointment for personal counselling. Initially he was a very angry man, but persevered with regular counselling sessions. Over time his focus changed from aggression and anger at Justine towards spending quality time with his children.

In January 2018, David and Justine participated in a joint family dispute resolution session where they agreed on and developed a parenting plan for the ongoing care and well-being of their children. Justine began attending individual counselling sessions at David's suggestion. They continued to attend individual sessions, as well as couple's counselling sessions. David and Justine started to spend time together when he collected or dropped off the children to her home.

By the end of May they had decided to get back together.

Both David and Justine are keen to learn more about parenting and would like to do the Bringing Up Great Kids program. Later this year the family will be relocating to another town in the Limestone Coast, where they will continue to use ac.care's services through outreach.

TED in Prison

For many of us having a roof over our heads or food to eat is just a given. Many others struggle to find a long term and safe home.

We have been offering the Tenancy Education Program (TED) as a way of empowering clients to be in a better position financially and emotionally. But how could we take this one step further and offer the program to those who are living in prison? How could we provide learning pathways to reduce their chance of re-offending?

We started thinking about how we could deliver 'Living in the Real World'. Recognising that each person has different needs, we designed the program to provide resources and skills in:

- Where to go, What to do, How do I get a roof over my head?
- How can I afford it?
- How to maintain a rental property?
- How do I manage my money?
- Living on the Outside the challenges, linking in with support networks, coping skills and being resilient.

To date over 60 offenders have engaged in the program at the Mount Gambier Prison with funding from the Department of Industry and Skills and at Mobilong Prison through support from the Department of Correctional Services.

But it doesn't stop there: once released from prison, people can link in with other services offered by accare and by providers such as OARS (Offenders Aid and Rehabilitation Service), further reducing the risk of recidivism.

Me Being Me

The 'Me Being Me' program is a partnership between ac.care and the North Gambier Primary School.

It equips groups of up to six children from 8-10 years with extra learning strategies and a variety of tools for better wellbeing and more positive interactions. Here is what they had to say:

"The access in our community to children's counselling and art therapy based programs is limited, we feel fortunate to have such a strong and productive partnership in place".

In light of the success of this program, we will also be offering it from our Family Relationship Centre, making it accessible to many other children.

Make Thyme for Gardening

The Mount Gambier Community Centre ran a six week program called Make Thyme for Gardening. The program was funded by a Positive Ageing Grant from Health SA and was designed to engage seniors in the community.

A group of enthusiastic and creative people gathered each week to participate in a variety of different gardening activities. The first session was held at Bunnings where the resident garden expert, Liz Watts, conducted a session about 'What to Plant and When'. Participants then constructed their own herb garden.

ac.care volunteer Annette Cassidy ran the next session which was 'Design Your Dream Garden.'

In the third week, the group took a trip to see the stunning Aberfoyle Gardens at Kongorong. A professional florist visited the next week and taught the basics of flower arranging. It was so much fun and the creations were fantastic!

Get Creative with succulents was the fifth session and everyone had a great time creating a living succulent wreath.

For the final session, participants made a Christmas Table decoration, and the creative talents were again on show.

James' Trials and Triumphs

James is 31 years old. For the past 10 years, he has been sleeping rough. Lately, he has called a caravan in Berri his home. His three dogs Kudda, Jaz and Lillith are keeping him company.

Since the beginning of 2018 James has been working with ac.care to find private rental. However, due to James receiving New Start and having pets to care for, the number of suitable and affordable properties have been minimal.

His significant health issues meant he could be considered a priority for public housing, but James needed to provide medical evidence. The lack of transport, other costs involved and long waiting times for an appointment with a GP made this very difficult.

Luckily ac.care partnered with RiverDocs and Country Health SA to provide anyone living on the riverbank in June with a free health check

Thanks to this initiative. James underwent a full medical examination, including a chest x-ray and blood tests, at no charge. He even received free prescription medication and a referral to a lung specialist. He finally had his medical issues confirmed and as a result, Housing SA have offered James a home. The rent is affordable and he can still have his dogs with him

"To be able to store food properly, have a shower at my disposal at any time, and not have to walk into town to go to the toilet, makes a big difference, especially with my lungs. Also I now have somewhere secure for my doas"



Bank shares wealth Mount Gambier charity awarded \$30,000

WELFARE organisation ac.care has received \$30,000 as part of the Commonwealth Bank's Centenary Grant program in recognition of its ongoing support to the South East community.

A total of 1000 grants valued at \$10,000 have been distributed by Commonwealth Bank this year to mark its 100 year legacy of giving.

The Mount Gambier, Millicent and agribusiness branches were all allotted \$10,000 to donate to whichever charity they decided and all three independently chose ac.care.

ac.care strategy and innovation general manager Ute Hermann-Bullock said the grants came as a complete shock to the charity.

"When I first got wind of it I was blown away that we had been chosen by not just one of the branches, but all three," she said.

"We are amazed by the generosity of Commonwealth Bank and have already made plans for where the funds will be distributed.

"We aim to use the money to support young people moving out of our 24-hour care service and into out of home care.

"Some of the funds will also go towards our financial counselling program, which not only helps those who have outstanding debts, but also aims to create awareness to prevent

debt from occurring."

More than 13,000 current and retired bank employees donate a portion of their income to CommBank Foundation, with Commonwealth Bank contributing up to \$2m each year as well.

The inspiring and far reaching impact of the work undertaken by ac.care was a crucial factor in it receiving the grant.

"It is important to us that we support local organisations like ac.care," Commonwealth Bank Mount Gambier branch manager Louise Cronin said.

"It is incredible to see how they support the wider community and in particular local youth.

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"When we first found out about the CommBank Foundation's Centenary Grants program, it was so exciting to have the opportunity to nominate a local organisation that is meaningful for us.

"It was a unanimous decision for all of us to choose ac.care to receive the \$30,000 grant."

Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements

Firstly, I would like to start by thanking Robyn Ashby, her team and my fellow members of the Audit Committee for their support and efforts throughout the year. I would also like to thank Simmonette Thompson, Finance Manager, for her long-standing dedication and commitment to the organisation and wish her all the best in her new career outside of ac.care.

I am pleased to be able to report to the members and stakeholders of ac.care that the organisation is in a stable financial position and is well placed to remain so well into the future. Our current ratio remains strong at 2.23, well above our target of 1.5 and we have maintained a healthy cash position.

When reviewing the Statement of Comprehensive Income for the financial year ended 30 June 2018 the transfer of the Housing Association significantly impacted on the result. Due to the manner in which housing assets were required to be held in the accounts the eventual transfer of these assets resulted in a loss on sale of over \$12 million. Removing the impact of this unique event a surplus for the year of \$486,717 was achieved, a great turnaround from the \$76,384 deficit reported at last year's AGM.

As an organisation we are unable to sustain continued deficit results and the timing of this surplus could not have been better. With a new strategic plan in place the need to invest in new technology, infrastructure, facilities and staff to enable us to better serve our community is clear. All stakeholders expect and deserve services of the highest standard and this can only be supported through prudent management of our financial resources.

Finally, I would like to make special mention to 500 business and community members who helped us raise \$125,000 at our 2018 Support Homelessness Luncheon. Since it began, 848 local people including children have been assisted with the funds raised at this bi-annual event.
